This is a letter from John McConville, Executive Director of the Polk County Free Medical Clinic that meets the first and the last Saturday mornings of every month. Amazing things happen each week. Here, from John McConville, is a letter to volunteers thanking and acknowledging their work. (If you are available to volunteer, please sign up on the website. http://www.salemfreeclinics.org You don't need medical training, and there are many jobs needing to be done that don't involve medical training.)

Greetings Polk Community Free Clinic (PCFC) volunteers,

I hope all of you are doing well. We had nice clinic yesterday where we saw eleven patients with three providers. Additionally, we had two education appointments. We had two walk-in patients Saturday, both with critical needs. Seven patients (plus some family members) received prayer. Fortunately, we had three interpreters because we had six Spanish speaking patients. We also had one Korean patient and, surprisingly, Kristie knows some Korean and could communicate with her.

I am so pleased that we can accommodate walk-in patients at Polk Community Free Clinic. As I mentioned, we had two critical need walk-in patients Saturday. One of these patients arrived at the clinic at 6 AM. They were referred to us by the West Valley ER. This patient arrived at the clinic at 6 AM with their spouse. They wanted to be sure they could see a provider that day. This patient has a likely serious and complicated condition that needed to be looked at as quickly as possible. They knew they should have gone to a doctor a year ago when the symptom first manifested itself, but they do not have health insurance and they are just barely getting by financially. Our medical staff is doing every thing they can to get this patient the potentially life saving care they need. What breaks my heart about this story is that we could have seen this patient a year ago, at no cost, if only they would have known the clinic existed. My prayer is that the uninsured in the community will know about the free clinic and will come to the free clinic when they have a medical need.

I am so appreciative and proud of all of our PCFC volunteers. I want to give a special shout out to Judi, Kristie and Sue for volunteering in Dallas Saturday. These three gals are triage nurses who usually serve in Salem. Most of our regular Polk nurses were unavailable for this clinic and these three ladies sacrificed their Saturday mornings off and came out to Dallas to help us. We are very grateful for you assistance.

If you are available to volunteer for one of these positions please sign up on the website. (You don't need medical training, and there are many jobs needing to be done that don't involve medical training.)

The biggest fundraiser of the year for Salem Free Clinics is the Run for Hope and Health at Minto-Brown Park in Salem on Saturday, September 19th. There is a 10K run, a 5K run and a 2 mile fun walk. This is a great event so please consider signing up on the website to participate. **Polk Community Free Clinic** will be having our own fundraising event on **October 8th in Dallas**. Stay tuned for more details.

Your service to PCFC and your support of the clinic continues to make a difference to many in our community who otherwise would have no reasonable access to health care. You are greatly appreciated!

Is this perhaps a good time to revisit some New Year's Resolutions? Have you ever wanted to read the bible? If so, here are some interesting tips...

10 Tips for Reading the Bible for the First Time, written by: Patton Dodd

1. Start with this map.

The Bible is about a place — one eventually called Israel, but also its surrounding regions; later, the story spreads into parts of the Roman Empire... All of the stories in the Bible are about people who lived in those particular places long, long ago. Reading their stories without knowing something about their location is like watching a movie with your screen totally dimmed.

2. Don't read from start to finish — at least not right away.

I mean, you can do that if you want. But you might fail to get through many of the 66 "books" that make up the whole Bible. The first two books, Genesis and Exodus, can be engrossing, but then the story grinds down for long stretches. So give yourself permission to hop around, and even to start with the highlights. Which brings me to:

3. Read the best stories first.

The Bible has some greatest hits. In just a few minutes, you can read some quick stories that are among the most famous and influential pieces of writing ever. And you'll soon see why, because these tales tend to knock around in your head long after you've read them.

Here are four of my favorites, each of which takes between one and five minutes to read: Jesus and the woman caught in adultery (John 8:1-11, which is just beautiful); Jesus' Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-8, which might blow your mind if you've never read it); the first creation story (Genesis 1-2:3, which is best read slowly and out loud); the Binding of Isaac (Genesis 22:1-14, which is not for the faint of heart); and the entire, but very brief, Book of Jonah (which is like a dark comedy).

4. Read a re-ordered Bible.

When you're ready for longer stretches, try The Books of the Bible, a version that tries to correct for some odd choices made long ago. The order of books in most Bibles doesn't always make sense chronologically, narratively, or in terms of authorship. This version tries to present the Bible as a more coherent reading experience.

It also does away with those distracting chapters and verses, which have transformed the Bible into a long list of standalone verses that get put to all sorts of misleading uses.

5. If you have to read just one book, read Genesis.

You can spend a lifetime thinking about Genesis, and people do. It's my favorite book in the Bible in part because it shows up everywhere, all the time — in controversies about science and education, pressing social and political issues, and all sorts of great (or not so great) movies, music, and novels.


Genesis permeates the world, and the more you familiarize yourself with it, the more interesting and layered a place the world becomes.

- 6. But don't just read one book. At least read the Gospel of Luke, too.
- 7. Don't go it alone.
- 8. Read out loud.
- 9. Compare the Jewish Bible (TaNaKh) to the Christian Bible (Old and New Testaments).
- 10. Real reading means re-reading.

Whatever you read in the Bible, read it more than once. It's more fun that way, and way more worthwhile.

Remember this challenge?

Well there has been significant progress on defeating Malaria as well as another highly infections disease, primarily in Africa, that of Ebola.

This campaign started in 2008 when the Methodist General Conference adopted Global Health as one of four areas of focus. While previous work has made significant strides in Africa, Malaria continues to remain the key reason for hospitalization and one of the top killers of children under the age of 5 years and pregnant women.

Imagine No Malaria is a ministry aimed at raising \$75 million toward the elimination of malaria deaths in Africa by 2015 - and eliminating Malaria as a scourge is actually doable! The World's First Malaria Vaccine Could Be Heading to Africa

The drug received a positive opinion Friday from European regulators and will now make its way to the World Health Organization for review.

The world's first malaria vaccine just got the green light from a European Medicines Agency committee and is one step closer to being approved for use in sub-Saharan Africa, the EMA announced today.

Mosquirix, also known scientifically as RTS,S, was given a positive review by the committee on Friday after the drug was assessed for quality, safety, and efficacy. Now it makes its way to the World Health Organization, which will take the EMA's positive opinion under consideration and determine in October how the vaccine will be recommended for use in Africa.

Created by pharmaceutical giant GlaxoSmithKline in 1987—with clinical developments later supported by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation (which funds TakePart World), PATH, and the Walter Reed Army Institute for Research—the vaccine is intended to immunize children six weeks to 17 months old and also protects against hepatitis B.

"This is a hugely significant moment," Ripley Ballou, head of research at GSK Vaccines, told BBC News. "I've been working on this vaccine for 30 years, and this is a dream come true."

Ebola vaccine trial proves
100% successful in Guinea
Rapid development and testing
of drug may bring current
epidemic in West Africa to an
end and control future
outbreaks, experts say.

A vaccine against Ebola has been shown to be 100% successful in trials conducted during the outbreak in Guinea and is likely to bring the west African epidemic to an end, experts say.

The results of the trials involving 4,000 people are remarkable because of the unprecedented speed with which the development of the vaccine and the testing were carried out.

Scientists, doctors, donors and drug companies collaborated to race the vaccine through a process that usually takes more than a decade in just 12 months.

"Having seen the devastating effects of Ebola on communities and even whole countries with my own eyes, I am very encouraged by today's news," said Børge Brende, the foreign minister of Norway, which helped fund the trial.

"This new vaccine, if the results hold up, may be the silver bullet against Ebola, helping to bring the current outbreak to zero and to control future outbreaks of this kind. I would like to thank all partners who have contributed to achieve this sensational result, due to an extraordinary and rapid collaborative effort," he said on Friday...

Because of the diminishing number of Ebola cases in west Africa and the shifting nature of the epidemic, with many sudden small outbreaks occurring across the region, researchers hit on a novel design for the trial.

The "gold standard" approach would be to take a population at risk of Ebola and vaccinate half of them while giving the other half a placebo. Instead, the researchers used a "ring" design, similar to that which helped prove the smallpox vaccine worked in the 1970s.

When Ebola flared up in a village, researchers vaccinated all the contacts of the sick person who were willing – the family, friends and neighbours – and their immediate contacts. Children, adolescents and pregnant women were excluded because of an absence of safety data for them. In practice about 50% of people in these clusters were vaccinated...
