Dear Church in two places:

Summertime, and the livin' is easy...

Maybe a little easy, but certainly beautiful, as we enjoy summer blossoms and await those tomatoes from the garden. And water. And water.

Looking back over our first year together, what fun we've had! We have started to get to know one another one to one, to my deep delight, and we have a ways to go yet! My reflections about my first year of ministry here have spiraled around to a new appreciation of my basic personality type – an introvert who needs sufficient time alone, who is most comfortable in very small groups (*where two or three are gathered...*), who comes alive in worship, and then needs to take a two-hour nap. Statistically, most clergy are introverts, in a culture that values extroverts. We do learn to compensate and act "outgoing" for meetings and other gatherings, but we may get overwhelmed with all the personalities and not be our most skilled selves in medium-sized or large groups. Some of you will resonate with this.



The author of a blog I to which I subscribe recently commented on her inner life. She wrote, "*Every time I move, I have to learn how to pray all over again.*" Whoa. I exhaled with recognition. A year ago, I moved here, and have expended great internal and external energy getting settled again. Gardening is part of my spiritual life – it is solitary, it is literally "grounding," and it can produce delicious "fruit." I am beginning to learn to pray all over again.

All to say, it is good to start feeling grounded as I work in the dirt, and tending to my inner growth as well; and to let you know that I desire more <u>small</u> group (Continued on page three.)

Catholic And Evangelical Leaders Agree: We have a Moral Obligation To Act on Climate Change June 23, 2015. Close to 100 faith leaders are calling for lawmakers to act on climate change, urging elected officials to heed the words of Pope Francis and pass legislation that can help slow the advance of global warming.

On Tuesday, a group of religious leaders took out a <u>full-page advertisement</u> on the back page of Politico to offer resounding support for Pope Francis and his recently-released <u>encyclical on the environment</u>, a landmark work of Catholic teaching which argued that governments have a moral obligation to address human-caused climate change.

"As Catholic and evangelical leaders, we are deeply inspired by Pope Francis' encyclical addressing our shared responsibility to be prudent stewards of creation," the ad reads. "As citizens of the most powerful nation in human history, we have a unique responsibility to promote sustainable development, reduce our dependence on fossil fuels and build a thriving culture of life that protects human dignity."

...Still, the move appears to be geared toward riding the energy sparked by Francis' encyclical, a nearly <u>184-page document</u> that made a robust, faith-based case for protecting the earth and taking action on climate change. In addition to <u>surprisingly vigorous discussions of climate</u> <u>science</u> and environmental issues, the letter <u>specifically refuted</u> old conservative religious arguments that God gave humanity the earth to exploit at will. Instead, Francis encouraged his fellow Catholics and other Christians to be good stewards of the earth, especially since the people most impacted by climate change are the poor and dispossessed.

"It is important to read the biblical texts in their context, with the right hermeneutics, and remember that these invite us to 'cultivate and care for' (Gen. 2:15) the garden of the world," the encyclical reads. "While 'cultivate' means to plow or work a plot, 'to care for' means to protect, heal, preserve, conserve, to watch over."

"The event has always been a safe ride, but we would feel better knowing that we've added this extra layer of safety. We are also in need of volunteers for the start and finish line of our race. From cheering on cyclists, to 'day of check in' and registration, this is a great volunteer opportunity for youth, children and adults to do together."

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United Methodists welcome health care ruling

The U.S. Supreme Court's decision to uphold subsidies for health insurance bought on the federal exchange comes as a relief to many United Methodist clergy and lay church employees. The ruling also affects millions of other Americans.

Four United Methodists conferences currently send all or some of their local church employees to buy insurance on the exchanges.

The 6-3 ruling in King v. Burwell also affects The United Methodist Church's longtime social emphasis on increasing people's access to health care.

Mourning for Charleston, then praying for action

Through Sunday sermons, prayer vigils and public statements, United Methodists are expressing feelings of sorrow, determination and hope over the racially motivated June 17 massacre of nine church members at Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church in Charleston, South Carolina... Rather than dissect the killer's motive, suggested the Rev. Cathy Jamieson-Ogg, Columbia, South Carolina district superintendent, focus on the bigger picture. "We may be tempted to overanalyze what happened, but let us look forward and ask, 'What will motivate us to prevent this kind of violence from happening again?' she noted. "What will motivate us to tear down racial, political, ethnic, economic, and religious boundaries, and build a world of harmony and peace?"

...Action is required beyond prayer vigils, said the Rev. Tiffany Knowlin, pastor at College Place United Methodist Church in Columbia, South Carolina, in her sermon. "We must open our mouths for silence is consent. Individually and collectively, we must stand for that which is right, if and when we see and engage troubled people who have said they wish to harm others. We are morally responsible for saying, for doing something."

Still, when family members of the victims told the accused shooter they forgave him, "that's the positive response of a child of God," said the Rev. George Ashford Jr., pastor of Journey United Methodist Church in Columbia, South Carolina.

But communities need to wake up and look at society's challenges, Ashford added. "Anytime the church is under attack, we're all under attack." <u>http://www.umc.org/news-and-media/mourning-for-charleston-then-praying-for-action</u>

PC(USA) advocates celebrate Supreme Court decision on same-gender marriage Church leaders say education is the next step

JUNE 26, 2015 | LOUISVILLE

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is celebrating the U.S. Supreme Court ruling that same-gender couples have a constitutional right to marry nationwide, striking down bans in 14 states. Church leaders believe today's ruling is a step in the right direction as society's views have continued to change in recent years. In its 5-4 opinion, Supreme Court Justice Anthony Kennedy wrote "the right to marry is a fundamental right inherent in the liberty of a person and under the due process and equal protection clauses of the 14th Amendment, couples of the same sex may not be deprived of that right and that liberty."

"The PC(USA) has advocated for almost four decades for civil rights for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender persons.
