Friends:

As the academic year starts up, we've been busy gathering school supplies and preparing for our Hospitality Week, which occurs just as school begins for our school-age guests.

The new program director for the Western Compass campus ministry has been hired (see page 3), and she will hit the ground running come September 1. I have been fortunate to gather information on campus ministry over the past few months, to prepare me to be a better advisory board member. Last week, I read on an Episcopal Church's young adult website about an intentional community of young adults reporting out on their year at St. Hilda's House, an Episcopal Service Corps site in New Haven, CT. Here is a powerful statement from young adults who are a bit tired of having others speak for their generation. I think you'll agree that they speak well for themselves:

The authors of this volume aren't interested in a dying Church. We aren't interested in hearing about declining attendance, spiritual apathy, or the incompatibility of faith and reason. We've grown up hearing that the Church must either reinvent or perish in the face of all these things- it gets repetitive, and it doesn't preach.

We are committed to a Church with a future — a future which is much the same as its past. We are committed to a Church which cannot count on a dominant culture for its sustenance. We are committed to a Church which doesn't count strength in terms of numbers. We are committed to a Church which recognises no foundation but Jesus Christ, which builds its life around His Word and Sacrament. We are committed to a Church which lives with and for the oppressed and downtrodden, working in faith so that the love of God might be borne to all.'

Amen to that! Blessings as autumn arrives.

My Mama Told Me So: An Introduction

Hello my Christ Church family.

I have been invited to share a column in the newsletter and hope to give you short notes from writings and conversations with my mother May Gustafson. Mama loved Christ Church. She passed away February 2014 and is greatly missed. She was a religious scholar and strong mystic, and had a love for teaching. She completed her Masters of Divinity and spent time as a local pastor. She held many teaching jobs and was full of love for the world. In the end her faith was so strong it was an example to me daily. My goal is to pass on her teachings through notes from my life and let her teachings continue to reach out.

"He who began a good work in you will be faithful to complete it." This quote came from a notebook mama had begun with written prayers for VBS one year. She wrote out prayers for each child and all the workers. For example, "Denvy, Jesus has begun a good work thru you and Jesus will be faithful to complete it".

This is a very good reminder for me. I get too caught up in, -what is my purpose? Why do I exist? But this message gives me hope and a bit of peace. God knows, God created me and yes I am his vessel. I live in an assisted living facility where they help me with my many meds, meals and routine care; and the days often feel repetitive. I get lonely; I get down - thinking how life could be without all the medical issues. It reminds me to 'let go and let God' (another of Mom's favorite sayings).



The foundation of Mama's teachings to me, were to build a life centered in coming close to the holy; see the holy in each other 300 and the natural world. I felt lost when she died but here she is telling us, God began a good work in me and will be faithful to complete it.

Why These Religious Groups Wear What They Wear

Clothing worn by religious leaders and people of devout faith often is much more than a fashion statement...



Buddhist monks and nuns robes are worn... to reflect the simple life... and create a "uniformity of intention" visible at first glance.



Catholic priests "Catholic priests have traditionally worn a cassock, or long robe, modern clergy often wear simple black suits and... a clerical collar, a narrow, often white band that attaches to the clergy shirt.



Orthodox Jews Orthodox Jewish women are encouraged to cover their hair and wear skirts below their knees as a sign of modesty... men typically wear long black garments to indicate a "lack of concern for color and other dictates of fashion... thus helps keep priorities straight..."



Jain monks and nuns are encouraged to live austere lives. Many show this by wearing plain, white robes...



Sikhs (traditional) Sikh spiritual clothing, or bana, includes a turban, modest attire and the five articles of faith... as a way of identifying members of the faith and binding them together.



Mormon missionaries...are required to wear modest clothing and plain hairstyles...
The clothing guidelines are meant to ensure that missionaries look "professional" and "attractive," according to their LDS website...

Muslims



The Hijab. Most often, the hijab, a head covering only, is worn by Muslim women as a symbol of modesty and privacy...

Sheila & Abaya – An abaya is a long black, loose fitting cloak that often zips or buttons up the front. The sheila is a rectangular scarf that covers the head... and is... worn for cultural reasons rather than religious purposes.



The Niqab is often mistaken for a burqa; the niqab fully covers the body, but only partially covers the face, leaving a narrow opening for the eyes.

Burqas fully cover the wearer, often there is a net window over the eyes so the wearer can see out, but no one can see in.



The <u>Chador</u> is more common to Iran. It is a long billowing dress that leaves the face open but covers the wrists and ankles.
