Pastor's Ponderings. Friends,

Even as the echoes of our Christmas Eve services reverberate, even as the end of the year rushes toward us, I find myself more often anxious than at peace or even hopeful – *that thing with feathers that perches in the soul* (with thanks to Emily Dickinson)...

I preach about newness, about transformation, about conversion – those gifts that the Spirit offers us, continually, yet Change. Just. Scares. The. Hell. Out. Of. Us. All of us.

Here is an observation by faith development psychologist, the late James Fowler:

When we are grasped by the vision of a center of value and power more luminous, more inclusive and more true than that to which we are devoted, we initially experience the new as the enemy or the slayer – that which destroys our "god." Alfred North Whitehead wrote, "Religion is the transition from God the Void to God the Enemy, and from God the Enemy to God the Companion." Only with death of our previous image can a new and more adequate one arise.

Can we be grasped by a new image of God? One that calls us to change, no matter our age?

A UCC clergywoman and poet, Miren Tirabassi, wisely wrote (with her prompt, the wonderful Ecclesiastes poem, "There is a time...: see the entire poem at https://giftsinopenhands.wordpress.com/2015/12/31/5385/)

There's a time to seek, to lose, /and to wonder why I came here in the first place; / a time to tear down any old walls that are still standing, / and a time to stitch up my lips; lots of time to keep silence ... / in front of a sunrise, /a child's smile, and several enthusiastic plans / that I know won't work out, / and a time to speak kindly and with lots of love ... / after that happens. / There are months and months and months for love, / and a couple hours to hate loneliness, cancer, / and Alzheimer's Disease. / There is a time to really hate war, racism, intolerance, / and a time to work for peace, / no matter how old or tired or frustrated I feel.

This is the time for hope, for change, for God to become new to us, and real, and friend.

Homeless Count. Each year, on the last Wednesday of January Marion and Polk counties conduct a comprehensive count of the homeless population. Thousands of individuals across both counties experience homelessness each year. The vast majority

of these are individuals for

illness, abuse, addiction, inability to work, collapse of a family, and ultimately the loss of a place to live. The Homeless Count serves the community in the following ways:

- Increases our understanding of homelessness, including information about the causes and impacts of homelessness.
- Provides us the information needed to plan and identify resources and services to better help individuals out of homelessness, and prevent it in the first place.
- Accurate homeless statistics are necessary to receive continued federal funding (almost one million dollars annually) for homeless programs in Marion and Polk counties.



Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon is a statewide association of Christian denominations, congregations, ecumenical organizations and interfaith partners working together to improve the lives of Oregonians through community ministry programs, ecumenical, and interreligious dialogue, environmental ministry, and public policy advocacy.

- "Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon's (EMO) Board of Directors strongly condemns the anti-Muslim rhetoric coming from public figures and other individuals. These statements are xenophobic, racially prejudiced, and clearly contrary to our values as people of faith and as Americans.
- This language serves to divide, denigrate and incite violence against our brothers and sisters of various religions, races, and ethnicities. Our country must learn from the mistakes of its past and uphold our constitutional



- commitment to defend the freedom of conscience and religion for all individuals.
- Oregon stands together with all people of faith and goodwill for religious and racial tolerance, and we are committed to working towards just and compassionate communities that value the human dignity of all."

Continuous snows, floods and the strongest hurricane ever recorded make up some of the biggest weather stories to come out of 2015. While U.S. communities still deal with the impact of this year's unusual weather patterns, staff members of the Presbyterian Hunger Program and Environmental Ministries say poor countries are facing serious economic and health issues related to the weather.

Climate change impacts everyone, but poorer countries have fewer resources to help them adapt or quickly recover from severe flooding or drought....

"No one knows the right time to plant anymore. For some countries, farmers knew it always rained around mid-January. When you have that first rain, you know it is time to go to the farm and get the ground ready for planting," he says. "That's not happening anymore. Mid-February comes and you are still waiting for rain. The seasons of drought are pro-longed and when you have the rain, it's too much and damages everything."
