What is "Session Moderator"?

In the Presbyterian system, when a church is without a pastor the Commission on Ministry appoints a minister to be Session moderator. That person chairs the meetings of the Session until a pastor is called or appointed.

The Commission on Ministry has appointed me, David Mote, to that role for Christ's Church. I will chair the monthly meeting of your Board and be a connection with the Presbytery. Your new District Superintendent is beginning this month, so your connection with the United Methodist Church will continue as always.

I am a retired pastor living in Albany. I served as pastor of churches in Colorado, Utah, and California. Then I took the interim pastor training and served a two-year interim in Seattle before retiring for the first time.

I retired to the San Francisco Bay Area, near where I had grown up. That lasted six months. Then I was persuaded to give up retirement for a six-month interim pastorate in Richmond. That began a pattern of retiring and un-retiring. Five and a half years ago I flunked retirement for the fourth time and moved to Albany to be interim pastor of United Presbyterian Church. Three years ago I retired for the fifth time, but it only lasted five months. The interim pastor of a church in Eugene needed to leave before the search process was finished, so I stepped in to finish that interim. Two years ago I retired for the sixth time.

Other than volunteer jobs, like being your Moderator and filling in on an occasional Sunday, I've managed to stay retired. I look forward to the successful conclusion of the search for Christ's Church's next pastor.



Building a Church in Gambell, Alaska

At General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) in June of last year, Denvy and Gail visited an information booth about ministry in Alaska and learned of a need to help build a church in Gambell on St Lawrence Island, just 36 miles from Russia.

This need was mentioned in conversations from time to time and several persons and a college sorority thought we should go help. As time passed through attrition the team pared down to eight persons from throughout the country; North and South Dakota, Washington and, of course, Oregon.

The team is gathering in Anchorage on June 20, will



fly to Nome for an overnight on the sanctuary floor in Nome and then onto Gambell for 9 days. The building which has been worked on for several years is enclosed so the work will probably be electrical, heating, trimming and painting, but at this point the job is undefined.

St Lawrence is a narrow island is about 100 miles long that was inhabited by about 4000 locals before "white men" in whaling ships affected their lifestyle. The dozens of villages now are two with several hundred residents. Now with global warming the subsistent lifestyle is threatened as animals, like whales, walruses and seals don't come to the island as much.

The Presbyterian Church has served this area for many years not only as a religious organization but also as a supportive group for the community. The new church will serve as a community center as well as a place of worship.

If there are adequate Internet connections, the team will attempt to write daily reports of their activities. Keep tuned in for details.

Another congregational conversation is coming on Sunday, July 16th!

Please plan to stay after worship on Sunday, July 16th to engage in another conversation around the tables to gather hints about where God is calling Christ's Church next. We will have lunch and then discuss together whom God has placed on our hearts, what can we uniquely do that others can't, and what do we feel called to do such that we will invest our time, talent and money to engage with it?

This conversation will build on our prior conversations about who we are as individuals and who we are as a congregation. Some background information will be coming over the next three weeks to aid you in reflection and prayer. Everyone's input is needed! We hope you'll join us!

Below are some general thoughts to ponder about the need to ponder our calling!

Steve Ross has served as the Conference staff person for congregational vitality for the past seven years with the Oregon-Idaho Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church. He is leaving that position July 1st to become a local church pastor again. He is looking forward to the change, as he believes that it is in the local church where "the Body of Christ is most powerfully expressed."

In a sort of farewell blog, Steve shared four things thriving congregations have in common:

- Vital congregations nurture vital leaders. The common qualities of these leaders are that they are *personally committed* to following Jesus in ways that transform the world into something more like the kingdom of God he proclaimed. Vital leaders collaborate with one another, making the most of one another's gifts. And they believe in that God is not finished with the congregation they lead.
- Vital congregations are convinced that they have a unique calling of God that is evident in the intersection between who they are as a church (strengths, passions, assets, convictions) and where they are (the needs, challenges, assets, culture of the community where they are). They believe that they have everything they need now to accomplish everything God wants them to do now.
- Vital congregations care more about fulfilling their calling than about being comfortable. They are *mission focused*. Their calling always involves not only serving people, but inviting the people they serve to become servants as well.
- Vital congregations understand and embody the fact that *sustaining vitality* is more like housekeeping than house building. It is not a season of effort resulting in a new or better thing, but a way of living that constantly creates, nurtures and maintains life. The programs and ministries of vital congregations are under constant evaluation and reformation so that they can provide the space where a constantly changing community of people can know a serve Jesus Christ in a constantly evolving mission context.
