The year 2014 marks the 151<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation. Because of the groundbreaking work of our ancestors, slavery was outlawed in the United States. However the legacies of chattel slavery continue to haunt our society even as we turn to face a new form of slavery: human trafficking. More than 20.9 million people are estimated to work in conditions of forced labor worldwide according to the International Labor Organization. On January 11, consider marking human trafficking day with prayer and action.

### All Lives Matter – A Lesson from Hebrew Midwives

...When Israel was in Egypt's land

The Hebrew midwives narrative in Exodus 1:15-21 highlights an indecent human proposition.

Shiphrah and Puah. Under government sanctions, are enlisted to participate in extermination of Hebrew boys... Justifiable homicide was made politically expeditious and socially acceptable in response to the presupposed threat Hebrews boys posed...

Truth told, as Christians we are confounded in similar ways every day. Situations like Michael Brown, Eric Garner, Trayvon Martin, kidnapping of Nigerian girls, immigration reform, the comprehensive global response to Ebola and so on create ethical challenges. Important to understand is our day-to-day living remains answerable to our faith...

Obviously, Shiphrah and Puah sought vigilance over violence. They exercised discipline over destruction. The realized there is credence for the practice of prayer as protest and protest as prayer. The midwives epitomize how God-fearers should respond faced with longstanding, systemic and culturally oppressive realities. When faced with having to do the right or righteous thing, they elected righteousness – being in right alignment with God's will and way. The women were divinely defiant, diplomatic, and destined in their redress.

Divine defiance is agitating or acting against legacies, systems and the practices that challenge our faith life. Defiance is a spiritual call to being antithetical to the world's kings. Theirs was diplomacy that created a unique relational exchange...

Lastly, the midwives were divinely destined, They had clear understanding that statesanctioned killing of Hebrew babies could result in provable demise of others, When pharaoh was done killing Hebrew boys, were girls next, or Semitic people? The women recognized their destiny was interconnected with what happened to others babies.

Without their civil resistance and resoluteness for the sake of the Hebrew boys, there would be no Moses for any of us. These outsiders' acts of simple heroism in the prayer/protest, "Black lives matter."

...Acknowledge that wherever, whenever, however, whosoever is forced to live through or die from unjust and inhumane treatment, it is spiritually damning because ALL LIVES MATTER!

How do visitors determine the friendliness of a church? We asked our interviewees. Their response was simple, yet insightful. Visitors determine the friendliness of a church by the number of people who talk with them! That's it. Simple but significant! (No surprise. Right?) We asked them one more question: "When did you conclude that the church you visited was — or was not — a friendly church?" More than any other, the critical time for making a friendly impression is the ten minutes right after the service ends.

Walking the Labyrinth is an ancient spiritual act that is being rediscovered during our time. Labyrinths can be found in almost every religious tradition around the world.

The labyrinth in Christ Church's Prayer Room is a finger labyrinth. It is to use the same way you walk a labyrinth, but where you don't have room to set up a walking labyrinth. The European labyrinths, like the one at Chartres mentioned (see illustration), were designed in part as substitutes for going on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land when the politics and wars made that impossible. So the finger labyrinth is another accommodation to experience the spiritual discipline if the physical journey is not a realistic possibility.

A labyrinth is a tool, a path for prayer – a walking meditation. It is not a maze. There are no tricks or blocked pathways.

This is an eleven-circuit labyrinth like that embedded in the floor of the Chartres Cathedral in France

Tips for walking the labyrinth: You simply walk in following the path and return out using the same path. If you meet others on the path, silently step aside



so that one of you can pass. As you walk, quiet your mind. Walk in silence. Let your body find your pace. Open your heart and your mind. Each walk is a different experience for each person. Think of the journey in three parts: The way in. The center. The way out.



Think of walking the labyrinth as a pattern for Christian Spiritual Discipline:

**PURGATION**: on your way in let your mind quiet. Let go of all that burdens you.

**ILLUMINATION**: in the center, give yourself time opening to what God may want you to hear or feel.

**UNION**: on the way out, be open to integrating this experience into your life.

Allow yourself time sitting in silence once you have finished the walk. What meaning did you find for yourself?

Record your thoughts, if desired, in your journal.

- 3. Name five people who have taught you something worthwhile.
- 4. Think of a few people who have made you feel appreciated and special.
- 5. Think of five people you enjoy spending time with.

The lesson: The people who make a difference in your life are not the ones with the most credentials, the most money...or the most awards. They simply are the ones who care the most.

In other words, they are people with whom you share love and relationship. ... May your coming year be blessed, your relationships with others be rich and filled with love beyond measure, and may you be healthy and at peace in this wonderful world God has bequeathed to all of us.
